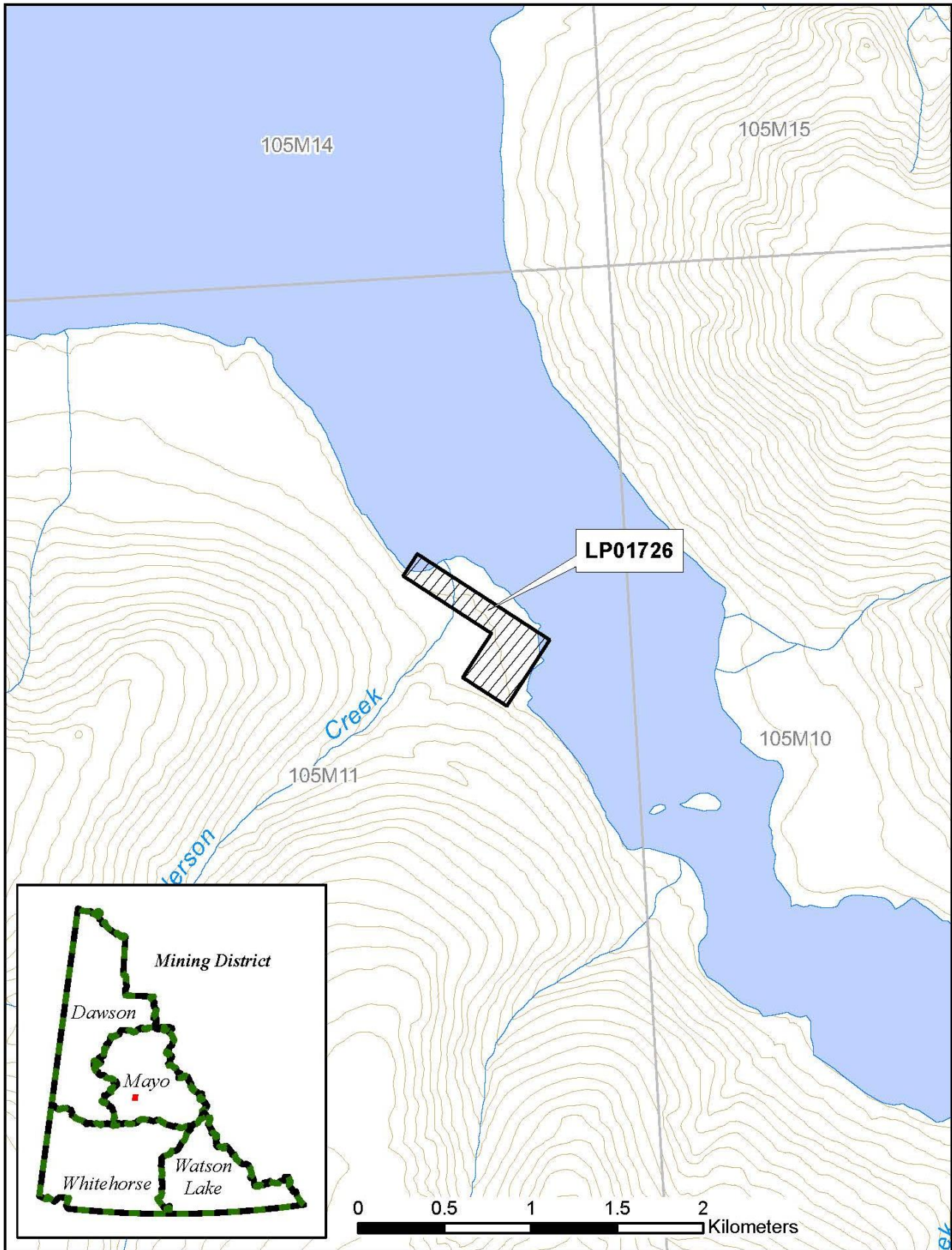

Definitions

“Access road” means a road that provides access to a public highway or to a private road

“Act” means the *Placer Mining Act*, SY 2003, c.13; SY 2013, c.18;

“Corridor” means a path from which trees and brush have been cut to accommodate a trail, waterline, fuel line or power line.

“Effective date” means the date this Approval comes into force as evidence by the date of the signature of the Chief;

“Foundation” means the part of a structure that penetrates the ground and supports the structure.

“Inspector” means an inspector designated pursuant to the Act;

“Isolated Road” means a road that does not provide access to a public highway directly of through a private road.

“lease” means a lease issued pursuant to section 92 of the Act.

“Line” means a line cut for the purpose of carrying out a geophysical, geological, or engineering survey.

“Low ground pressure vehicle” means a vehicle that applies 35kPa of pressure of less to the ground surface.

“Manager, Mining Land Use” means Chief of Placer Land Use, pursuant to the Act.

“Operation” means a placer land use operation.

“Operator” means a person who is engaging in an operation;

“Person-day” in respect of the use of a campsite, means the use of the campsite by one person during a period of 24 hours.

“Response” means a notification given by the Manager, Mining Land Use, under section 103 of the Act.

“Road” means a pathway for vehicular traffic the construction of which requires the movement of rock or earth.

“Site” means the area bounded by the sum of the mineral claims described above under ‘Scope of Approval’;

“Stripping” means excavation, undertaken as part of an operation that is limited to the removal of trees, brush and the vegetative mat.

“Summer” means the period of a year that is not winter.

“Trail” means an access to a site within a claim or lease that is constructed with little or no movement of rock or earth.

“Trenching” means excavation that extends below the vegetative mat, undertaken as part of an operation.

“Upgrading”, in relation to road, means re-establishing a road that has not been useable for more than five years by vehicles of a type the road was originally designed to serve, modifying a road to provide usability for vehicles that are of a different type than those the road was originally designed to serve and any other upgrading or modifying of a road, other than for maintenance or erosion control.

“Vegetative mat” means the organic surface of soil, characterized by the accumulation of organic matter, of partly decomposed organic matter, derived from leaves, twigs, and woody materials, and includes the root mass of living vegetation.

“Winter” means the period of the year during which

- a. The ground is frozen sufficiently to support a vehicle, other than a low ground pressure vehicle, without rutting or gouging of the surface, and
- b. There is a sufficient amount of snow on the ground to produce a packed base of 10cm.

PART ONE – GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

Duration of Approval

- 1.0 This approval is valid upon signature of the Manager, Mining Land Use until the expiry date or until a Class 4 approval is issued. In the event that mineral titles lapse, or that agreements to operate on mineral titles are dissolved, the Approval becomes null and void for that portion of the operating plan, where there is no right to the minerals.
- 1.1 All outstanding reclamation continues to be the responsibility of the operator.

Compliance with Operating Conditions

- 1.2 All operating activities must comply with the Operating Conditions contained in Schedule 1 of the *Placer Mining Land Use Regulation (Appendix B)*. These Operating Conditions are enforceable.

- 2.2 All spills must be reported immediately to the 24-Hour Yukon Spill Reporting Line (867) 667-7244 and to the Northern Tutchone Mining Inspections Office (Compliance, Monitoring and Inspections) at (867) 996-2343.
- 2.3 An operator who takes an emergency remedial measure shall, as soon as possible but not later than 10 days after taking it, send a written report to the Manager, Mining Land Use describing the duration, nature and extent of the emergency and the measures taken to respond to it.

2.4 The operator shall contact the Northern Tutchone Mining Inspections Office (Compliance, Monitoring and Inspections) at (867) 996-2343 at least 14 days prior to commencing the field season.

2.5 The operator shall contact the Northern Tutchone Mining Inspections Office (Compliance, Monitoring and Inspections) at (867) 996-2343 at least 14 days prior to leaving the site at the end of the operation.

Heritage

2.6 All paleontological resources uncovered during operations shall be reported to the Yukon Paleontology Program, Government of Yukon in Whitehorse at (867) 667-8089 or (867) 667-5386.

2.7 All archaeological resources uncovered during operations shall be reported to the Yukon Archaeology Program, Government of Yukon in Whitehorse at (867) 667-3771 or (867) 667-5386.

2.8 The report(s) developed for Section 3.2, shall be submitted to Government of Yukon – Mining Lands, Mineral Tenure and Exploration Branch and the Heritage Resources Unit, Cultural Services Branch.

Wildlife

2.9 All incidents with wildlife shall be reported to the District Conservation Officer in Mayo (Northern Tutchone Region) at (867) 996-2247, as well as any other communication regarding wildlife.

PART THREE – TERMS AND CONDITIONS

Erosion Control and Permafrost

3.0 The operator shall insulate the ground surface beneath all temporary structures and temporary facilities used in the project where permafrost is present to:

- a) Prevent any vegetation from being removed, and
- b) Prevent the ground from settling or eroding

3.1 The operator shall ensure effective temporary and permanent erosion and sediment control measures such as sediment barriers, geotextile covers, slope texturing, or redirecting drainage area are implemented on disturbed areas and overburden piles to prevent erosion and sedimentation.

Historic Objects and Burial Grounds

3.2 Subject to the results of the Heritage Resources Overview Assessment carried out by Tourism and Culture and identified on the map dated October 31, 2025, no work shall occur within areas with elevated potential for the presence of heritage resources until a Heritage Resources Impact Assessment has been completed and submitted to the Manager of Mining Lands for approval.

3.3 Upon discovery of a heritage resource, the operator shall notify the First Nation of Na-Cho Nyak Dun Heritage Department in addition to Government of Yukon, Manager, Mining Land Use and Yukon Heritage Resources Unit.

Disposal of Wastes/Cleanliness

3.4 The operator shall keep all garbage, including kitchen waste, in a container that prevents access by bears and other wildlife, until properly disposed of in accordance with the *Solid Waste Regulations*.

3.5 When burning kitchen waste on site it must be burned regularly to reduce odours that might attract wildlife and be burned to ash by forced air or fuel fired incineration.

3.6 The operator shall install and maintain an electric fence around the perimeter of camp, or at the minimum, around the kitchen, food preparation and storage area, grey water sump, and waste disposal area.

Fuel and Chemical Storage and Handling

3.7 All fuel cache(s) must be protected with an earthen berm or suitable barrier and flagged to prevent spills resulting from accidental contact with heavy equipment. Flags should be visible above the snowpack.

3.8 The operator shall clearly identify the owner, the contents and the date on fuel drums to establish and manage ownership and responsibility.

Spills and Spill Contingency Plans

3.10 All fuel spill equipment and materials must be maintained in a state of readiness sufficient at all times to contain and clean-up any hazardous materials spills.

3.11 The location of any spills shall be clearly marked until cleanup has taken place. Location markings shall not be removed until directed in writing by an Inspector.

3.12 The operator shall develop and submit a fuel Spill/Contamination Contingency Plan for approval by the Manager, Mining Land Use, prior to fuel being stored on claims. This plan shall include but is not limited to, 1. Procedure for containing and/or re-mediating spills, 2. Reporting procedure should a spill occur.

Trenching

- 3.13 Open trenches shall be sloped at one end to avoid entrapment of wildlife.
- 3.14 The operator must ensure that all employees and contractors working at the trench sites are aware of the operating conditions for trenching.

Wildlife

- 3.15 Activities shall cease if moose are observed from the active work areas until the animals have moved away on their own accord.
- 3.16 All mining activities, including but not limited to trenches, test pits, ponds, reservoirs, and overburden piles shall be constructed, maintained and reclaimed in a condition that prevents wildlife entrapment, and does not impede regular movement of wildlife, i.e. sloped to allow wildlife egress.
- 3.17 The operator shall avoid conducting land-clearing activities during the typical bird-nesting period for Yukon (May 1 to August 31). If avoidance is not possible, the operator shall conduct a non-intrusive search for bird nests prior to clearing activities taking place. If active bird nests are discovered, project activities shall be postponed in the nesting area until nesting is completed.
- 3.18 The operator shall report any incidents involving nuisance bears or any wildlife exhibiting food conditioning or habituation to the District Conservation Officer. Reporting these incidences will allow the Conservation Officer to recommend additional deterrent methods.
- 3.19 The operator shall provide information, training and equipment to all staff on bear safety. Guidelines for Industrial Activity in Bear Country can be found at the following link:
<https://yukon.ca/en/guidelines-industrial-activity-bear-country>.
- 3.20 The operator shall use end-of-pipe fish protection screens that have appropriately designed screen areas, materials and shapes as well as an appropriate withdrawal flow rate to avoid the death and entrapment of fish. The operator shall use DFO's Interim standard: Water intake end-of-pipe fish screens", available online at: (<https://www.dfo-mpo.gc.ca/pnw-ppe/standards-normes/fish-screen-grillage-poisson-eng.html>) and the tool to determine the water withdrawal flow rate for the chosen screen design (<https://fishprotectiontools.ca/basicendofpipe/>). An appropriate depth and flow (i.e., base flow and seasonal flow of water) shall be maintained in all watercourses for the protection of fish and fish habitat.

Security

3.21 Security may be required at any time by the Manager, Mining Land Use. The operator must furnish security within thirty (30) days of receiving the written notice from the Manager, Mining Land Use of the requirement to post security.

Reclamation

3.22 Reclamation and/or decommissioning shall be progressive in nature where possible and will occur prior to the expiry of the exploration program or prior to the expiry of this approval, whichever comes first, according to standards outlined in the operating conditions, unless otherwise specified by the Manager, Mining Land Use.

3.23 The operator shall follow the guidelines outlined in the latest version of the "Yukon Revegetation Manual: Practical Approaches and Methods" before, during and following Project activities that disturb vegetation and soils.
(<https://emrlibrary.gov.yk.ca/ebooks/YukonRevegetationManual2013highres.pdf>).

3.24 Debris, equipment, fuel barrels, scrap metal and other waste at the work site shall be completely disposed of, so as not to attract wildlife, by removal to an authorized disposal site at the cessation of the exploration program or prior to the expiry of the approval, whichever comes first.

3.25 Reclamation and/or decommissioning of new roads and trails shall be progressive in nature and shall occur as soon as they are no longer needed for mining activities. The operator shall submit a map, and shapefiles (including distances) of created and reclaimed roads and trails annually to the Manager, Mining Land Use. This map shall be shared with First Nation of Na-Cho Nyak Dun.

Wetlands

3.26 Prior to undertaking project activities in wetlands, the operator shall determine the presence of wetlands and current site disturbance through a physical assessment and shall submit a high-quality map to the Manager, Mining Land Use, representing locations of wetlands, disturbed areas and relevant features. The map must meet Mineral Resources' digital mapping standards (<https://yukon.ca/en/mineral-resources-branch-digital-mapping-standards>).

3.27 The operator shall avoid mining and developing mining-related infrastructure in undisturbed wetlands, unless avoidance is not possible, in which case, the operator shall minimize disturbance to wetlands. Any wetlands identified in the project area impacted by mining, must be reclaimed to standards set out in the Ruby Creek Guidelines (<https://yukon.ca/en/wetland-reclamation-guide-ruby-creek-and-indian-river-east-block-placer-mine-2015-0150>), and any other direction required by the Manager, Mining Land Use.

Communication

3.28 At least thirty (30) days prior to each field season, the operator shall communicate plans and timing of activities, including details of progressive reclamation planned for each season, to the First Nation of Na-Cho Nyak Dun (867-996-2265) and other land users (e.g. outfitters, trappers, tour guides etc.). The operator shall work with these First Nation governments and land users to identify potential land use conflicts arising from these activities. The operator shall make best efforts to resolve identified conflicts. The operator shall provide all records of communications (e.g. emails, letters, meetings, discussions) on plans and timing of activities to the Manager, Mining Land Use, upon request.

Camp

3.29 The operator shall ensure appropriate measures, including posting and/or distribution of a workplace harassment policy, are in place to ensure a safe workplace for all employees and visitors. The operator is reminded that this Notification does not remove the need to comply with other legislation or regulation, such as the Workplace Health and Safety Regulations https://laws.yukon.ca/cms/images/LEGISLATION/SUBORDINATE/2006/2006-178S/2006-178S_2.pdf under the Occupational Health and Safety Act.

PART FOUR – FINAL DECOMMISSIONING

4.0 All petroleum products and any other hazardous substance must be removed from the site when the operation ceases or prior to the expiry of this approval, whichever comes first.

4.1 All waste petroleum products and any other special waste, as defined in the *Special Waste Regulations*, generated in the course of carrying out the operation must be disposed of in accordance with the *Special Waste Regulations* when the program ceases or prior to the expiry of this approval, whichever comes first.

4.2 Debris, equipment, fuel barrels, scrap metal and other waste at the work site shall be completely disposed of, so as not to attract wildlife, by removal to an authorized disposal site as often as is practicable throughout the mining season and completely at the cessation of the operation or prior to the expiry of this approval, whichever comes first.

4.3 Structures must be removed and the site restored at the end of the exploration program or prior to the expiry of this approval, whichever comes first, to a level of utility comparable to its previous level of utility.

4.4 Final reclamation will occur prior to the expiry of the exploration program or prior to the expiry of this approval, whichever comes first, according to standards outlined in the operating conditions for re-establishment of vegetative mat and erosion control.

5.1 Notice of Schedule III must be provided to the Yukon Water Board ten (10) days prior to use of water.

APPENDIX B

Placer Mining Land Use Regulation

Schedule 1 **Operating Conditions**

A Removal of the vegetative mat

1. If the vegetative mat must be removed to carry out an operation, it must be removed so as to protect the seed and root stock contained within the mat and be stored separately from any overburden or bedrock removed for use in re-establishing the vegetative mat when the operation ceases.

B Re-establishment of the vegetative mat

2. (1) All vegetated areas disturbed by operation activities, including fuel and waste storage areas, clearings, corridors, camps and supporting infrastructure, and trenches and drill sites, must be left in a condition conducive to re-vegetation by native plant species or other species adaptable to the local environment to encourage revegetation comparable to similar, naturally occurring, environments in the area.

(2) Conditions conducive to re-vegetation include provision of an adequate soil layer with moisture retaining ability, no soil contamination by hydrocarbons or other hazardous substances, provision of adequate seed or root stock and contoured or otherwise stable slopes.

3. If adequate seed stock or root stock is not naturally available, re-seeding or transplanting of vegetation is required. Only non-invasive species may be used for reseeding or transplanting.

C Erosion control and permafrost

4. All areas disturbed during an operation must be re-sloped, contoured or otherwise stabilized to prevent long term soil erosion, slumping and subsidence.

5. All operations must be carried out to avoid or minimize damage to and loss of permafrost.

D Trenching

6. Trenching carried out by hand or using hand-held tools must be methodical. All trenches must be stabilized and marked to minimize risk to the public.

7. Trenches constructed with mechanized equipment must be backfilled by first depositing any removed overburden and bedrock and then replacing the vegetative mat that was removed to construct the trench.

E Historic objects and burial grounds

8. Operations must not be carried out within 30m of a known archaeological or paleontological site unless the Manager, Mining Land Use indicates, in writing, that such activities may be carried out.

9. Any sites containing archaeological objects, paleontological objects or human remains or burial sites discovered in the course of carrying out an operation must be immediately marked and protected from further disturbance and, as soon as practicable, the discovery reported to the Manager, Mining Land Use. No further activities may be carried out within 30m of the site until the Manager, Mining Land Use indicates, in writing, that the activities may be resumed.

F Solid waste

10. All solid waste, including debris, equipment, barrels, drums, and scrap metal, must be safely stored on the operation site while the operation is carried out and must be disposed of in accordance with the Solid Waste Regulation when the operation ceases.

11. Camps must be kept clean and tidy.

G Petroleum fuel and hazardous substances

12. If petroleum fuel storage capacity exceeds 4000L, a secondary containment structure must be constructed. The containment structure must be made of a material impervious to petroleum products and

(a) if there is a single storage tank, be of sufficient size to accommodate at least 110% of the capacity of the storage tank; or

(b) if there is more than one storage tank, be of sufficient size to accommodate 110% of the capacity of the largest storage tank or 10% of the total capacity of all of the tanks, whichever is greater.

13. All petroleum products, including waste petroleum products, and any other hazardous substances must be stored in a secure fashion no less than 30m from the ordinary high water mark of any water body.

14. All petroleum products, including waste petroleum products, and any other hazardous substances, must be transferred and handled without spillage.

15. All petroleum products and any other hazardous substances must be removed from the site of the operation when the operation ceases.

16. All waste petroleum products and any other special waste, as defined in the Special Waste Regulation, generated in the course of carrying out the operation must be disposed of in accordance with the Special Waste Regulation when the operation ceases.

H Spills and spill contingency plans

17. A spill contingency plan for petroleum products and other hazardous substances must be prepared and posted in the camp and at all fuel handling locations used in carrying out the operation.

18. All spill clean-up equipment and materials must be maintained in a state of readiness sufficient at all times to contain and clean-up any hazardous materials spills.

19. If a spill occurs, the spill contingency plan must be immediately implemented and notice given to the 24- hour Yukon Spill Report Line. As soon as practicable, an inspector must be contacted. Whatever remedial action is required to clean-up the spill and reclaim the affected land and water must be taken.

I Use of vehicles

20. Vehicles must be maintained and operated to prevent spills of fuel, lubricants, coolants and oil.

J Timber and brush

21. Cut brush must not be piled so that it blocks movement of wildlife or people.

22. Leaning trees created by the cutting of lines, corridors, and clearings must be felled.

23. When it is economically viable to do so, timber suitable for sale must be salvaged and stockpiled.

24. All risk of fire hazard must be avoided.

K Drilling

25. All reasonable efforts must be made when drilling to minimize impact on wildlife and the public.

26. Drill holes that pose a hazard or that lead to ground water must be plugged to prevent flow of water to the surface.

27. The location of drill holes must be marked by flagging or other suitable means at the location of the drill hole.

L Roads, trails and off-road and trail use

28. All vehicles must be operated to avoid rutting and gouging of roads and trails.

29. Off road and trail routes must be reconnoitered and must be used in a way that minimizes ground disturbances, including damage to permafrost and sensitive wildlife habitat.

30. If rutting, gouging, ponding, or permafrost degradation occurs off road or trail, vehicle use must be suspended or relocated to ground that is capable of bearing the weight of the vehicle without causing such damage.

31. Use of skids on permafrost or wet ground is only permitted outside of winter where it is not reasonable to use any other means of transporting equipment.

32. Routes for trails must be reconnoitered and flagged.

M Release of sediment

33. All reasonable care must be taken in carrying out an operation near or adjacent to a water body to prevent sediment from entering a water body, unless otherwise permitted by law.

N Use of explosives

34. Explosives must be set off in a manner to minimize impact on wildlife and the public and to ensure that forest fires, unplanned landslides, or artificial damming of water bodies does not occur.

Operational Guidelines

Bears and other wildlife

To increase worker safety, reduce potential conflicts and prevent unnecessary wildlife mortality, the operator should implement pertinent components of:

Work in/near water
